FONOM Board Meeting

Friday, October 27, 2023

President D. Whalen welcomed everyone to the meeting and called the meeting to order at 8:34 am

1.0 Welcome and President's Report

FONOM October Board Meeting

- Danny shared the Boards dismay at the tragic events in Sault Ste Marie. He asked Sandra to share with her Council our Boards sympathy
- Danny thanked Dave and Christine for opening their home to the Board and Thursday evening. Their hospitality was very much appreciated.
- Thank you to all the Board members who participated in our AMO
 delegations and assisted with the hospitality suite. We can take a bit of pride
 in how well our Suite is attended and the number of Ministers, Deputy
 Ministers, Parliamentary Assistants, and top staff that show up. It is also
 highly spoken of by delegates and trade show participants.
- I have, since our delegation with Minister Kerzner and Minister Downey, spoken at length with staff as we prepared our letter to the federal government regarding bail reform. I have also spoken with staff regarding the lack of O.P.P. representation on the topic and have since been in talks with a member of the provincial force in North Bay.
- I have spoken with Dean Surma of NOSM U about our delegation with the Ministry of Health and the funding shortfall NOSM U is facing.

 Municipalities are sending letters supporting FONOM and our request.

 NOSM U greatly appreciates our support and efforts.
- I have the Executive Director for the Cochrane Family Health Team reach out regarding doctor recruitment. One doctor mans the local health care facilities. The physical capacity to host and graduate students for required placements does not exist. They have created and are pitching the idea of virtual placements as an option for smaller areas. I have asked for a letter outlining the situation and Program they envision to be sent to the FONOM Board.
- The College of Physicians has contacted me to discuss the doctors and health services across the North. They seem to be interested in making a presentation during the annual Conference.
- I spent some time speaking with both the Ministry of Natural Resources and the Ministry of the Solicitor General regarding upcoming funding announcements.
- I will be attending a virtual meeting with NOMA NOSM-U. There is a lot of discussions and questions regarding the doctor shortage in the North. While NOSM-U claims 80 + % of the graduates remain in the North, this does not seem to hold true when we look at the current shortages.

3.0 Timed Delegations

Hope Air – Mark Rubinstein

Mr. Rubinstein joined the meeting at 10:10 am and presented the slide deck on pages 16-34. He shared with the Board the mission, history, challenges, and opportunities for Hope Air. Following the presentation, Mark answered questions from Board Members and clarified ways FONOM will be able to assist their ask of the Minister of Health.

Following a discussion by the Board.

It was MOVED by D. Plourde SECONDED by L. Carleton that

The Federation of Northern Ontario Municipalities believes that Hope Air provides a valuable Service to vulnerable individuals of Northern Ontario. Therefore, be it Resolved FONOM supports Hope Air in it's request to the Minister of Health, Sylvia Jones, for a Private-Public Funding Model.

MOTION CARRIED.

The Minister of Mining, **George Pirie**, joined the Board Meeting for an hour. He spoke about the success of Mining Week, as well as updated the Board on the developments of several mining projects in Northern Ontario. Minister Pirie commented on how well Ontario is positioned to benefit from the EV industry, which will go a long way to wean us off our reliance on Fossil Fuels. He spoke

to a shift where the public looks North for economic prosperity, including discussions involving deep seaports in Hudson's Bay. These Ports are closer to those countries that will require Rare Earth Metals. He also spoke about the importance of having processing in Ontario as well. D. Whalen and the balance of the Board thanked Minister Pirie for sharing his views and being so generous with his time.

5.0 BUSINESS ARISING FROM THE MINUTES

5.1 D. Whalen and S. Hollingworth discussed the merits and purpose of Project ECHO and the impact wounds have on Northern Health Care. The Board supported the ideals and the general principles of Project ECHO. But the Board also discussed that no funding will be provided.

It was **MOVED** by **L. Carleton SECONDED** by **A. MacNevin** that the Board, *also that no funds will be provided to the Project.*

5.2 The Board shared their thoughts on the Creation of a Conference Reserve, noting that unforeseen events could negatively impact Conference Revenues.

It was **MOVED** by **T. Kelly SECONDED** by **D. Plourde** that the Board supported the following Resolution.

Whereas the Federation of Northern Ontario Municipalities (FONOM) holds an annual conference based on bid submissions

And whereas this annual Conference requires significant financial commitments before the actual event

And whereas many external pressures (Pandemics and other medical or social emergencies) could impact the financial results of the annual conference negatively

And whereas any impact on the annual conference revenues may impact FONOM's financial ability to conduct business on behalf of its membership

5.0 BUSINESS ARISING FROM THE MINUTES - continued

Therefore, it resolved that the Board of Directors create a Conference Reserve to offset any negative impacts from any future conference loss. The target amount of the Conference Reserve is to be four months of FONOM's Annual Budget

Further, any deposits or withdrawals from the Conference Reserve be by Resolution of the Board of Directors

MOTION CARRIED.

5.3 During the September Board Meeting, J. Curley asked about the selection process for FONOM's Auditor. He asked if the Board had supported a Resolution appointing Bakertilly to do the following year's Audit. M. Bain noted that there has been no Resolution, and having one is prudent. He also shared the history of our previous Auditors and that Mac has a good working relationship with Bakertilly.

It was **MOVED** by **T. Kelly SECONDED** by **D. Plourde** that the Board supported the following Resolution.

Whereas annually, the Federation of Northern Ontario Municipalities seeks an audit opinion on its financial statements for the year ended March 31

Therefore, Bakertilly be appointed the auditors of the Federation of Northern Ontario Municipalities for the years, 2023-2024 & 20234-2025

6.1 Resolutions Received – Classification of Black Ash as an Endangered Species

The Federation of Northern Ontario Municipalities is concerned with the Province of Ontario's Classification of Black Ash as an Endangered Species. Furthermore, FONOM agrees that a more thorough understanding, economic study, and consultation are critical to planning before classifying a species as endangered. This is particularly important if the strategy if applied, will severely impact the economy, agriculture, forestry, tourism, recreation, First Nations, and residential landowners.

FONOM supports having the Ontario Black Ash Recovery Strategy rescinded until such actions are taken.

8.3 M. Bain recapped the Northern Hospitality Suite in London. Over 500 people attended the Suite, including over twenty ministers and staff. Mac shared a few lessons learned, and he and Deb will tweak them for next year. Also discussed were our partnerships for next year; following a discussion, the Board decided it would no longer partner with NOMA on the Northern Hospitality Suite.

8.0 ADMINISTRATIVE MATTERS (continued)

- 8.4 M. Bain shared the current statistics of round two of the Go North Video Project. Also, he provided the Board with a proposal from Good Gauley Productions if the Board wanted to move forward. The Board was pleased with the response to the GoNorth Project to date. The Board singled out the efforts of Drew Gauley and Jennifer Baker. The Board directed Mac to discuss with FedNor if they have an appetite to fund a third round.
- 8.5 M. Bain updated the Board on a conversation with Michael Atkinson regarding the SNOED Program. FONOM has placed a page on our website that links to the Program's site. Also, FONOM has communicated directly with the Membership information about the Program. Mac also shared new ideas to aid the Program, like sponsoring up to 10 staff or Council members from communities with a population of less than 2,500. This would hinge on receiving support from FedNor.
- 8.6 M. Bain shared that the reminder Membership notices went out in September and have received a great response. There are currently five members that have yet to renew.
- 8.7 M. Bain briefed the Board on the 2024 FONOM Conference planning. The Board reviewed the type of Agenda they would like the Conference to have.

9.0 REGIONAL REPORTS

City of North Bay

M. Horsfield noted that the City of North Bay supported the NOSM Funding Resolution, and she is bringing forward a resolution on Intimate Partner Violence at the next council meeting.

District of Nipissing

T. Kelly, as FONOM's representative on the Municipal Advisory Committee of the NWMO, shared that they would like the Board to consider a tour of the Oakville Demonstration Centre. Terry and Mac will chat with the NWMO representatives to discuss details.

District of Algoma

L. Watson shared with the Board that he attended the recent ADMA meeting. He referenced a presentation from Wawa and Dubreville on the negative impact on their communities from proximity to Mining Facilities. The communities sharing receive very little revenue from the operations. ADMA members also voiced concerns about challenges with Ontario OneCall. Lynn also noted a new Highway snowplow contractor has started in Algoma, and they hope they work out.

9.0 REGIONAL REPORTS - continued

District of Manitoulin

A. MacNevin noted that the Island Hospitals have announced several times that emergency days will be closed. But fortunately, with last-minute locums, the departments could stay open. Al talked about the announcement of the Mill closure in Espanola. He attended an information session and learned that only 20% of the Mills employees live in Espanola. Therefore, it has a district-wide impact. He mentioned that the Province has been working with all affected people.

District of Cochrane

D. Plourde shared that the District is dealing with the negative impacts of short-term rentals on Doctors and Nurses providing Locums. Dave noted that many traditional long-term rentals are used for short-term rentals and that some motels are now long-term.

District of Parry Sound

L. Carleton mentioned she is the current President of the PSMA, and at its most recent meeting, she shared the activities of FONOM, including the GoNorth Video Project. Lynda shared that a Mental Health Vigil was recently held, with hundreds attending. It was noted that the meetings are being held to inform the District of the plans for the Northlander's return. Finally, Lynda mentioned that several communities in Parry Sound are passing resolutions asking the Province to step in and regulate short-term rentals.

City of Sault Ste Marie

S. Hollingsworth asked if FONOM had received a Resolution from our membership regarding Intimate Partner Violence. Hearing that we have not, she spoke to the Resolution that is being forwarded to Sault Ste Marie the following Monday. Sandra will ensure that FONOM receives the SSM Resolution; she asks that the FONOM Membership be sent copies of the Resolutions received.

District of Timiskaming

D. Whalen noted that much is being done in the District to promote the establishment of more Family Health Teams. He also mentioned that the region is seeking a meeting with the Minister of Transportation concerning the qualifications of many Transport Drivers. Also, Danny shared his concern about the shape of our highways in Northern Ontario. He noted that projects like the NWMO and Resource extraction will be impacted. Danny finally shared the concern with the Provincial pilot project for Part Three of the POA: no one is chasing Bail offenses.



Hope Air has completed 2,800 travel arrangements in Ontario to date (up 100%), and are projected to grow to over 8,000 travel arrangements per year for 2025

33% of Hope Air clients would be in debt,or cancel/delay their appointments without Hope Air. Hope Air has completed 2,000 flight trips in 2023 and is projected to grow to 3,500 flight trips by 2025.



Reducing effects of poverty



When individuals in rural and smaller communities delay or cancel their medical appointments that is when emergency situations happen, and other more costly travel services, such as Ornge, must step in.




Hope Air Funding Challenges










- Currently all programs funded through private sector donations

- Without government funding support, programs and services will be reduced or suspended. Patients will have reduced access to health care.




Hope Air with new government funding







Equitable access to healthcare Hope Air takes into account a socioeconomic lens when determining solely on the patient's location and medical needs. Hope Air's eligibility is focused on the unique needs of Ontarians from vulnerable communities.



Saving money for Ontario in the long-term Hope Air improves the financial capacity of its patients by providing services free of charge and disease agnostic, non-emergent travel assistance eligibility. In comparison the NHTG focuses allowing patients to have minimum disruptions to their life and ultimately their work. Hope Air allows Ontarians to get diagnosed and treated faster - without them the Ontario Healthcare system would be further strained with more acute patients.
